The Umpires may agree to play a further 30 minutes of extra time at the end of any of the first four days if a definite result can be obtained.

Any alteration to the hours of play will be announced over the public address system.

Stumps drawn on the fifth day at 6.00 or after 90 overs have been bowled, save that at 5.00, or after 75 overs have been bowled on that day, the last hour – during which a minimum of 15 overs shall be bowled, but otherwise

Laws of Cricket 16.6, 16.7 and 16.8 shall apply – will commence. If there is no prospect of a definite result, play may cease when a minimum of 15 overs remain to be bowled.
