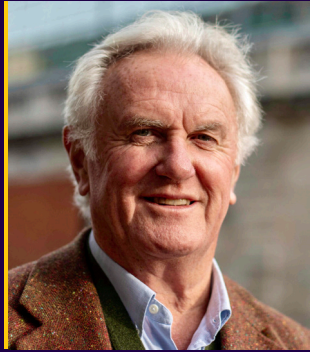

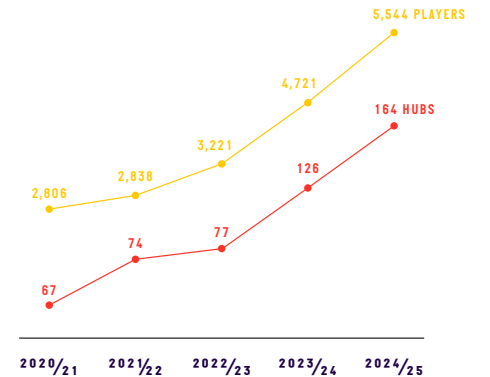

IMPACT 2025

Through our new partnership with Barclays, we have been able to continue the expansion of our MCCF National Hubs programme, with 164 Hubs offering free coaching and match play for over 5,500 state-educated cricketers in 2025.

Every participant benefits from greater physical and social engagement, using cricket to be active and make friends. More than this, the Hubs programme offers talented cricketers greater opportunities to develop their skills and enter the talent pathway, realising their potential to build a life and a career in cricket.

NATIONAL HUBS COMPETITION 2025

After 20 weeks of competition between 5,500 schoolchildren, across 164 sites, the MCCF National Hubs Competition concluded at Lord's in September. Guildford and York were worthy winners of the girls' and boys' under-16s tournaments respectively.

It was a great campaign for the York Hub as both its boys' and girls' teams reached the Finals Day at Lord's. In the day's first fixture, the York Girls were defeated by the reigning champions, Guildford Girls, by just four runs in a thriller, before York Boys were victorious over Leyton Boys by 11 runs. With both finals coming to exciting finishes in front of approximately 1,000 spectators, the day was a resounding success and a memorable one for every player, parent, coach and supporter present.

Guildford's victory, their third title, was not without drama. As well as defeating York by four runs in the Final, the Hub only just got over the line in their quarter-final against Southampton, Orlaith Coughlan hitting the winning boundary to seal victory by two wickets with just two balls to spare. Chloe Thornton was a standout performer in York's journey to Lord's, scoring 55 against Newcastle and 89 against Shropshire in the quarter-final and semi-final respectively.

There was great dedication in the Boys' competition, where Aberdeen Hub travelled over 300 miles to compete in their Round 2 fixtures, while the performances of 88 Hub participants in the North have earned them places in County Age-Group squads.

The under-14 Boys' final and Girls' Invitational XI matches took place on the Nursery Ground. Kent West beat Nottingham by 46 runs in the Boys' final, a result made all the more impressive by the fact that this was the first year of the Hubs programme in Kent. One of our smaller Hubs - Cirencester - did fantastically well to reach the quarter-finals. In the Girls' invitational fixture, the players from the South defeated their counterparts from the North by 58 runs.

"The MCC Foundation Hubs have been fantastic for Buckinghamshire, supporting our strategy to boost support for state school cricketers in the county. We've run eight squads - boys and girls at under-14 and under-17 level - at both Milton Keynes and South Bucks Hubs to maximise accessibility for all participants. We've had great commitment from the young cricketers, who have enjoyed being part of a national framework through MCCF, not just a bolt-on to programmes in Bucks."

We have fully integrated the Hubs as part of the Bucks Cricket County Pathway, with the same coaches delivering the Hub sessions as the County squads. That has paid dividends for the players - with seven boys and eight girls from 2025 MCCF Hubs having now been selected into 2026 County Age Group squads."

TALENT PATHWAY

After the programme of winter coaching sessions, we provide additional opportunities to the most talented players at under-16 level through a regional programme, with Hub participants entering from six regions across the UK.

These regional squads received a week of intensive training, culminating in match play against one another as well as matches against MCC teams. In 2025, the boys' regional competition was won by the South West. The girls' inter-regional fixtures took place at Oundle School in August, as part of a residential festival - a first for the Foundation. In the inaugural edition of the Clare Connor Cup (named after MCCF's Patron), the North East were crowned champions after three days of competitive cricket.

A similar regional programme for a younger age group was piloted with match play against the counties within their region.

As an indication of the calibre of players in the Hub Programme, we were delighted that 34 players have subsequently been selected for a county squad, beginning their development towards professional cricket.



FEMALE COACHING SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME



FUNDED BY THE NEVILLE ABRAHAM FOUNDATION

The Female Coaching Scholarship Programme supports girls aged 16 to 18 from our Hub network. Graduates develop the skills, confidence, and qualifications needed to pursue a coaching career and help to support the growth of women and girls' cricket in their local communities. Alongside strengthening the career pathways of Hub participants, the programme directly addresses the under representation of female cricket coaches in the UK.

Participants receive a comprehensive package of support, including formal coaching qualifications, hands-on experience through Hub and club volunteering, one-to-one mentoring, tailored individual support, and access to professional development opportunities.

In 2025, all 18 candidates graduated from Cohort 1, completing two years as the pilot group for the programme. Cohort 2, comprising 31 candidates, progressed into its second year, while a further 30 candidates were recruited into Cohort 3 by year-end.

Across the year, Cohorts 1 and 2 contributed over 500 volunteer hours across 27 Girls Hubs nationwide. During the summer, both cohorts came together for residential training events, completing coaching qualifications and engaging in continued professional development workshops.

DAISIE

Cohort 1 member Daisie graduated from the Coaching Scholarship Programme in 2025 after contributing 57 volunteer hours at the Worksop Girls Hub. Through her coaching at the Hub, Daisie reported a significant boost in confidence, translating directly into her wider coaching practice.

In recognition of her outstanding commitment, she was awarded Nottinghamshire's 'Game Changer' Cricket Collective Award in 2025 for her volunteering across the Worksop Girls Hub and her club. As a direct outcome of the programme, Daisie has since secured paid coaching roles within Nottinghamshire community programmes.



BERRY

Berry volunteered at the Hull Girls Hub, Hessle CC and girls' County Age Group programmes at Yorkshire in 2025 to gain experience in her pursuit of a career in coaching. She was the first candidate on the programme to undertake a paid coaching role with the MCCF as she became one of the coaches for the North-East Girls Regional Springboard programme in the summer. Berry will be returning to the Hull Girls Hub as a paid coach in 2026.

UPPINGHAM SCHOOL RESIDENTIAL AUGUST 2025

Over the course of one sunny week in August, participants in Cohorts 1 and 2 came to Uppingham School, each for a three-day residential, which included a series of technical and tactical coaching and professional development workshops.

These workshops included:

- Scenario-based activities developing observation as a core coaching skill, alongside an understanding of the technical, tactical, physical and mental aspects of the game
- Practical sessions on modern batting shots (including ramps and scoops), supporting coaches to confidently teach skills often seen at the elite level
- Mock assessments providing constructive feedback on coaching delivery
- Professional development workshops on networking and use of LinkedIn

Candidates discussed their coaching progress over the past year and their plans for the next academic year - some are going to the same university and will benefit from a pre-existing association on the campus.

During the same week, 26 candidates from Cohort 2 completed the ECB Foundation Coach course. In collaboration with the ECB Coach Development team, this course piloted a new delivery structure, with additional workshops to enhance learning opportunities. The course was led by Sara Begg, one of the ECB's National Coach Developers, and supported by five other female Coach Developers.

The week ended in celebration for the graduating Cohort 1 candidates. Families were invited to join the presentations and refreshments were on hand to mark the hard work, commitment and success of these candidates. Each candidate was presented with a trophy and certificate to commemorate their time on the Female Coaching Scholarship Programme, and details about the new Alumnae Network were shared.

BARCLAYS KNIGHT-STOKES CUP



BARCLAYS KNIGHT-STOKES CUP LAUNCH

The Barclays Knight-Stokes Cup, named after two of England's greatest state-educated cricketers, aims to inspire state schools to develop boys' and girls' teams and drive state school participation in hard-ball cricket. Supported by Barclays and The Black Heart Foundation, it is the UK's first national hard-ball state secondary school competition.

The inaugural edition of the Barclays Knight-Stokes Cup will begin at the start of the summer term in 2026. It will start with local county competitions with winners progressing to national rounds before a boys' and girls' final at Lord's Cricket Ground on 10 September 2026.

The competition is the brainchild of Michael Vaughan, who played cricket at Silverdale Comprehensive School in Sheffield, and MCC Chair Mark Nicholas, who co-founded Chance to Shine which delivers cricket opportunities in state primary and secondary schools. Heather Knight and Ben Stokes have pledged their support and are keen advocates for improving opportunities for state-educated cricketers.

Entries for the competition opened at Lord's in June 2025, with significant media interest, including TV appearances on BBC Breakfast, which was viewed by millions of people. Twelve state secondary schools from across the country took part in hard-ball cricket activities on the Main Ground at Lord's and in its indoor facilities.

The initiative has been welcomed by ECB, county cricket boards, foundations and key charitable partners around the country, many of whom were involved in the launch presentation.

The Barclays Knight-Stokes Cup would not be possible without the financial support of several organisations. Further kit discounts have also been offered by other suppliers including Newbery, Icon Sports, Net World Sports, Sharks Cricket and Reeqip as well as Hunts County and V-Sports. Maiden Cricket, which offers bespoke cricket kit for women and girls, has also pledged discounts to make access to kit for schools more affordable.

CRICKET UNITES

Cricket Unites is the MCC Foundation's global framework for using cricket to bring people together, strengthen communities, and create positive opportunities for young people facing disadvantage around the world. Launched formally in 2025, it represents a significant step forward in how we deliver, support, and scale our international work.

At its core, Cricket Unites recognises cricket's unique ability as one of the world's most popular sports to transcend borders, cultures and circumstances. Through safe, inclusive, and high-quality programmes, Cricket Unites helps young people to develop confidence, leadership, life skills, and a sense of belonging—whether they are growing up in under-represented communities, affected by displacement, or facing barriers to participation because of gender, poverty or social exclusion.

A defining feature of Cricket Unites is partnership. In 2025, the programme formally embedded our long-standing collaboration with Cricket Without Boundaries, alongside trusted local delivery partners who bring deep contextual knowledge and community credibility. This partnership model allows the MCC Foundation to combine global expertise with local leadership – ensuring programmes are relevant, sustainable, and genuinely rooted in the communities they serve.

As we look ahead, Cricket Unites gives us a powerful platform for growth. It enables us to scale impact responsibly, deepen learning across countries, and strengthen our ability to demonstrate the personal, social, and community benefits of cricket.

Every day, somewhere in the world, a cricket project is taking place with the support of the MCC Foundation.

Every day of the year, an average of 700 young people benefit from an MCC Foundation international programme. Longstanding projects in Rwanda, Uganda, Kenya, Nepal, and Lebanon continue to deliver highly impactful programmes, providing life-changing opportunities for young people.



RWANDA

PARTICIPATION IN 2025:

50,000+ attendances across schools, community hubs and refugee settings, with near-gender parity maintained throughout the year.

FOCUS:

Combining broad participation with clear development pathways. Delivery across hubs including Kayonza, Nyamata, Ndera and Mahama provided regular training, competition and school outreach for thousands of young people.

ACTIVITY:

The national Seruka competitions acted as a key progression point, with players moving into representative squads and development camps. In Mahama Refugee Camp, cricket continued to offer safe, structured activity alongside life-skills education, HIV awareness and educational support.



UGANDA

PARTICIPATION IN 2025:

55,000+ attendances, with girls representing over half of participants across school and community programmes.

FOCUS:

Expanding both reach and depth, with hubs in Gulu, Jinja, Lira and Masindi delivering consistent school and community-based cricket. Gulu emerged as a regional centre, hosting national girls' school competitions and strengthening access through new community facilities.

ACTIVITY:

Cricket+ initiatives were embedded throughout delivery, including HIV awareness, life-skills education and the launch of Playing with Confidence, addressing menstruation and girls' participation in sport.



KENYA

PARTICIPATION IN 2025:

60,000+ attendances delivered through four major hubs, with balanced participation between girls and boys.

FOCUS:

Maintaining well-established hubs in Nairobi, Kisumu, Muranga and Nakuru delivering year-round coaching, competition and community engagement.

ACTIVITY:

Cricket+ remained central to delivery, including HIV testing and counselling, deaf cricket, environmental initiatives and leadership opportunities for young people.



LEBANON

PARTICIPATION IN 2025:

In 2025, this project supported approximately 180 children drawn from 20 cricket hubs serving 740-760 young people across Beirut and the Bekaa Valley. All participants are refugees living in encampments, where access to education and structured sport would otherwise be extremely limited.

FOCUS:

Delivered in partnership with Alsama Project, the project uses cricket as a tool for education, inclusion, and wellbeing. It prioritises regular, high-quality coaching; safe access to facilities and transport; and clear progression for boys and girls ready to move into more advanced formats of the game.

ACTIVITY:

Through a year-round programme delivered with Alsama Project, participants receive structured coaching led by one qualified coach and supported by junior assistants, with regular weekly sessions, equipment for training and matches, and safe access to facilities. Young people compete in the bi-annual Alsama Cricket Championship League and play additional fixtures against expatriate community teams, alongside shared international match-watching sessions that build understanding and connection to the global game.



NEPAL

PARTICIPATION IN 2025:

45,000+ attendances across Koshi and Madhesh Provinces, with girls and young women central to delivery.

FOCUS:

Using cricket as a platform for social change, with a strong focus on girls' participation and leadership in the face of significant disruption caused by political unrest.

ACTIVITY:

Reorganising competitions and sustaining participation. Cricket was used to address gender-based violence, menstruation dignity and life-skills development.

FURTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 INCLUDE:

- *The first official Alsama T20 hard-ball tournament, featuring international teams and a landmark victory for the Alsama men's side against Sri Lanka*
- *A mid-year mixed championship involving more than 550 players*
- *The largest soft-ball championship in Alsama's history, bringing together 1,000 students and 100 staff from across all hubs*
- *13 players entered a Leadership Training Programme, progressing towards assistant coaching and ICC certification.*
- *Two players became MCC Young Ambassadors.*



INDIA

A new Cricket Unites pilot in India has been launched, establishing a pioneering girls' cricket and life-skills programme in Mumbai and Pune in partnership with Cricket Without Boundaries, The Right Pitch, the OSCAR Foundation and Barclays.

Focused on girls aged 10-18 from underserved communities, the initiative combines weekly school-based sessions, hub-level progression for talented players, coach education grounded in Positive Youth Development, and high-profile soft-ball and hard-ball festivals to create safe, inclusive pathways into the game.

By training local coaches, embedding safeguarding and life-skills education, and showcasing girls competing in visible community events, this landmark programme marks a major step forward in tackling gender barriers in grassroots cricket and building a sustainable pipeline of female players, leaders and role models across India.





BRAZIL

A new partnership between MCCF, Cricket Brasil and Cricket Without Boundaries began in April 2025. The collaboration aims to establish community cricket hubs across Brazil, focusing on unearthing talent, fostering inclusive participation, and using cricket as a platform for social change.

Together with the MCC Foundation, MCC's men's and women's teams toured Brazil in October 2025, the first time MCC has toured with both squads simultaneously. The tour was a great success, with both teams playing seven matches each and leading coaching sessions to aid the development of cricket in the country.

In a true carnival of cricket, the players coached 600 children from underprivileged backgrounds in Poços de Caldas, one of the main centres for cricket in the country which is home to the Cricket Brasil High Performance Centre. All participants are benefitting from Cricket Unites: Brazil, a collaboration between MCCF Cricket Brasil and Cricket Without Boundaries.



GLOBAL REFUGEE CRICKET FUND

MCC Foundation together with Marylebone Cricket Club proudly launched the Global Refugee Cricket Fund—a bold initiative designed to extend the Foundation's work using cricket as a force for unity, dignity, and opportunity for displaced communities around the world.

The Fund strengthens existing refugee programmes while creating new global pathways of support. Its initial focus has been on Afghan refugees, responding to the urgent needs of players displaced following the banning of women's cricket in Afghanistan. In its first campaign, the Fund supported Pitch Our Future, an Australian-led programme empowering players from the Afghanistan women's cricket team who with the resurgence of the Taliban, were forced to flee to countries including Australia, Canada, and the UK. Through access to safe training environments, education, and wellbeing support, the programme has enabled players to continue their cricketing journeys –and, critically, to remain visible on the world stage.

In 2025, we supported the Afghan women's cricket team to attend the ICC Women's World Cup in India, using the platform to advocate for women's rights, inspire displaced communities, and reaffirm cricket's power to amplify voices that might otherwise be silenced.

Looking ahead, the Global Refugee Cricket Fund will broaden its reach—supporting refugee cricket programmes across multiple regions, investing in grassroots access, leadership, and safe participation, and ensuring that refugees everywhere can play, learn, and thrive through the game.



FUNDRAISING 2025

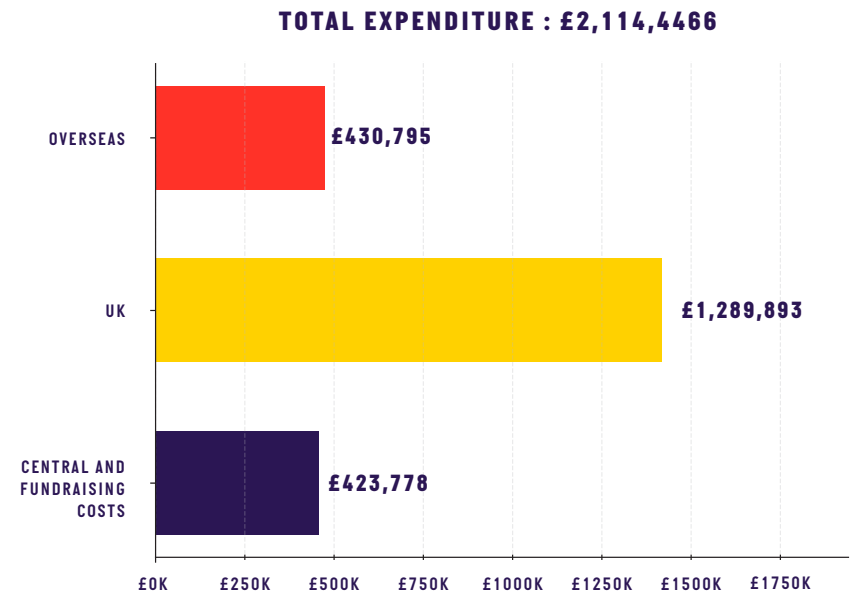
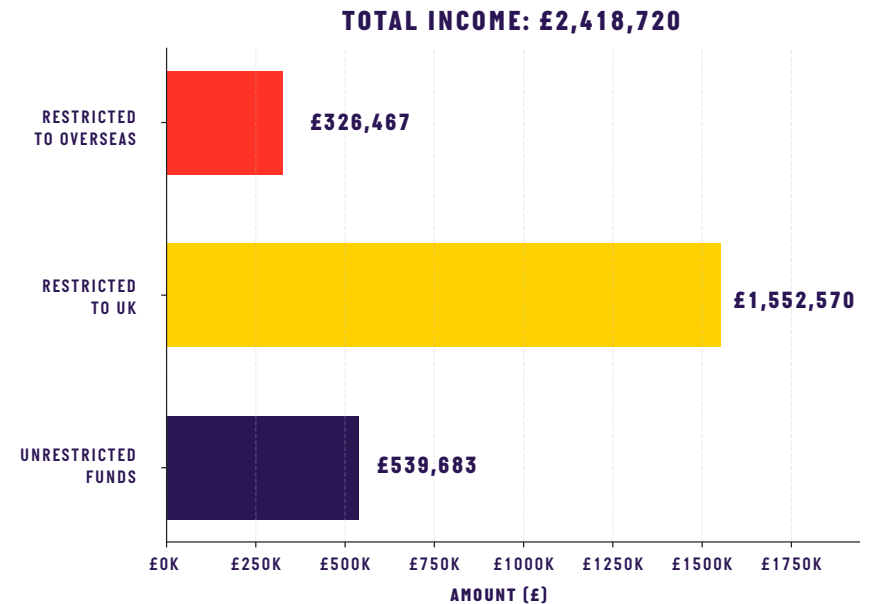
ECB has also confirmed their annual contribution until 2028, providing us with the financial security to plan our future Hub projects. This complements the contribution also made by MCC.
